

Immunisations, Infectious Diseases and Prevention Policy

Covers

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Intention

Nurturing Family Day Care Scheme takes the health and well-being of all children very seriously and in collaboration with all educators and families, reduces the risk of infectious diseases through immunisation, reducing expose to other children and minimising the risk of germs through proactive hygiene practices.

Overview

This policy, and all policies and procedures that are associated with the Immunisations, Infectious Diseases and Prevention Policy, are implemented at all registered residences and approved venues by all educators, staff and visitors who are allied with the scheme.

This comprises of -

- Immunisations.
- Being proactive to reduce and prevent the spread of infectious diseases.
- Managing infectious diseases effectively.

The approved provider will ensure -

- That educators and families are informed and educated about the importance of immunisations.
- Communication with all associated personnel of Nurturing Family Day Care Scheme remains professional and considerate of the sensitive situation that having an unwell child can create.
- That current immunisation status is obtained if an infectious disease occurs at a registered residence or approved venue, in order for the correct exclusion periods to be applied to all individuals applicable.
- That exclusion periods are enforced where required.
- The Public Health Unit is contacted for advice and are notified within 24 hours of an event and that the Serious Incident Procedure is followed where appropriate.



• Queensland and Federal Health Directive/s are followed as required.

Immunisation Procedure

The Immunisation program is one that is important for the health and wellbeing of all children and as such we work with the Australian government in promoting this message and following their lead in regard to children who are unimmunised. Nurturing Family Day Care Scheme does not require your child's immunisation history as the Australian government will prevent CCS from being issued if there is a child who falls behind the mandated schedule or who is unimmunised. Immunisation status is required on the online enrolment through Fully Booked.

All children at a registered residence or venue where certain infectious diseases are present will be asked for their immunisation record to continue education and care to determine if they are required to be excluded as per the recommended periods as stated in the public Health Act 2005 and listed in Staying Healthy in Child Care - Preventing Infectious Diseases in Early Childhood Education and Care (5th Edition) 2013.

Parents are able to access more information in regard to immunisations through contact with -

- Australian Immunisation Register on 1800 653 809, on the MyGov app or Medicare Express Plus app, which holds the Immunisation history statement that includes -
 - All past vaccines on the AIR
 - When they occurred
 - When the next ones are due
 - Any overdue vaccines

The approved provider will inform all parents and guardians at the time of enrolment, and upon new changes to legislation and law, that unimmunised children or children partially immunised will -

- Not receive any child care subsidies from the Australian government unless they have -
 - A medical exemption (medical contraindication or natural immunity certified by a general practitioner.
 - A Secretary's exemption.
- May be refused to be enrolled at a registered residence or approved venue if it is decided by the family
 day care educator directly associated with that address that they do not accept unimmunised or
 partially immunised children. In this situation
 - A parent or guardian will be required before starting education and care at the registered residence or venue to provide an immunisation history statement.
 - Will be required, within 4 weeks of the request, to provide an immunisation history statement at regular intervals (as the child passes the 2, 4, 6, 12, 18 months and 4 years <u>vaccination</u> <u>milestones</u>) to ensure that they remain up to date with the immunisation schedule.



• Be required to pay for absences that occur during exclusion periods for non-immunised children attending education and care at a registered residence or venue that has a case of a reported infectious disease.

Educators, and their families, are encouraged by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) to ensure that their immunisation status is up to date to protect themselves. Educators should consider ensuring that they are immunised in the case of pertussis (whooping cough), hepatitis A, measles, mumps and rubella (MMR), varicella (chickenpox), and influenza (required annually). Exclusion of educators and the members of their family may be enforced depending on their immunisation status.

Infectious Disease and its Prevention Procedure

Nurturing Family Day Care Scheme understands that through effective communication and collaboration with educators and families a united front line can be created against infectious disease. When, unfortunately, a situation arises where there is a case of infectious disease in the education and care setting, this partnership can minimise the spread and risk to all children.

The approved provider, educators, and families will assist in the prevention of infectious diseases by -

- Being up to date and sharing information on immunisations and the importance of remaining fully immunised for the health and well-being of all.
- Ensuring that the Health and Hygiene Policy is followed at all times.
- Keeping all areas of the registered residence or approved venue, its furniture, materials, and equipment (resources, toys, utensils, etc.) safe clean and in good condition.
- Minimising the spread of infectious diseases by being proactive when a child is displaying symptoms or signs of illness and remaining at home and away from the education and care setting until the child is well. Certain symptoms such as temperatures, vomiting, diarrhea require 24-hour exclusion time (from the last occurrence) periods before children can return to education and care in case of a potential serious illness.
- Communicating professionally with all parties when a child becomes ill, whether at their home or at the
 registered residence or approved venue, understanding that a child who is not 100% well is best
 recovering at home.
- Acknowledging that only a general practitioner can declare that a child's signs or symptoms are safe to
 be in an education and care setting and that a medical clearance may be required by an educator for
 the child to return to the registered residence or venue to ensure that an infectious disease is not
 spread to other children.
- Understanding why children are at times excluded from the registered residence and adhering to the periods advised by Staying Healthy in Child Care - Preventing Infectious Diseases in Early Childhood Education and Care (5th Edition) 2013.

In the event that an infectious disease occurs at a registered residence or approved venue, all associated personnel will –

- Not bring a child to a registered residence or venue that is not well enough to attend.
- If at a registered residence or venue, will move the child away from other children ensuring they are treated with respect and comforted.
- Contact the parent/s or guardian/s, or if not available the emergency contact according to the child's
 records, informing them that they or an authorised to collect individual is required to collect the child
 immediately.
- All relevant bedding, clothing, and material will be taken with the child or laundered by the educator and placed in direct sunlight to effectively clean from germs.
- All toys and resources that were in contact with the child will be removed immediately and cleaned and disinfected effectively.
- All areas (toilets, sleep room, etc.) of the registered residence or venue will be cleaned and disinfected effectively.
- Inform all families that attend the registered residence or approved venue of the event. A notice to be displayed, as well as communication about the infectious disease. At no time will the confidentiality of the child or their family be broken.
- The notice will display information about the infectious disease, its signs and symptoms and the relevant exclusion periods. It will not list any information about the child or family with the infectious disease.
- The approved provider will notify all families and request, if needed according to the type of infectious disease, the immunisation status (a statement from the Australian Immunisation Register) of each child and educator at the registered residence or venue. Children who have medical conditions that may be at additional risk will be assessed on an individual basis in consultation with the parent/s or guardian/s, their general practitioner, and the public health unit.



- The approved provider will follow all requirements as listed by the Queensland Health Department's Information for Schools, Education and Care Services and Child Care Services Contagious conditions -Public Health Act 2005, Chapter 5 Part 2 https://www.health.gld.gov.au/_data/assets/pdf_file/0030/374646/pha-cont-cond.pdf
- Require upon the return of the child or educator with the infectious disease, a medical clearance from a general practitioner stating that they are able to be in an education and care setting again.
